Algonquins of Ontario Archaeological Liaison Training Course

The Algonquins lived in present-day Ontario for thousands of years before Europeans arrived. Algonquin territory originally extended from the St. Lawrence River to the French River in the west, south to the Adirondack mountains in New York State, and north above Lake Abitibi. Over the past several hundred years, the description of Algonquin Territory has changed to be the lands and waters on both sides of the Ottawa River watershed from modern Hawkesbury to Lake Nipissing and north past the headwaters of the Ottawa River. Today, ten Algonquin communities comprise the Algonquins of Ontario:

- The Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation
- Antoine
- · Kijicho Manito Madaouskarini (Bancroft)
- Bonnechere
- Greater Golden Lake
- Mattawa/North Bay
- Ottawa
- Shabot Obaadjiwan (Sharbot Lake)
- Snimikobi (Ardoch)
- Whitney and Area

The AOO Settlement Area includes an area of more than nine million acres within the watersheds of the Kitchissippi (Ottawa River) and the Mattawa River in Ontario, the unceded territory that covers most of eastern Ontario, including Ottawa, and most of Algonquin Park.

As part of supporting consultation with the AOO, we are engaged in archaeological fieldwork across the Settlement Area. To build upon our capacity to be involved in projects, we require trained liaisons to participate in a variety of paid opportunities during the field season. To support building this knowledge and experience within communities, the AOO will be hosting two individual Archaeological Liaison Training.

The first training is sponsored and organized by Matrix Heritage. This will be an exciting and diverse day and will include archeological presentations by Matrix Heritage, True North Archeological Services, Kinickinick Heritage, and Courtney Cameron from Cameron Heritage. The day will exploring archeological concepts and techniques, sharing perspectives about archeology and hands-on exercises in and outside of the classroom.

Ken Swayze is a Professional Archaeologist who has completed over 500 compliance archaeological assessments in eastern and central Ontario, and recorded, sampled, conserved, or salvaged numerous archaeological sites. Other projects include field courses and assessments in Nunavut for the Inuit Heritage Trust; an archaeological master plan for the Nipissing First Nation; directing Public Archaeology excavations at Bonnechere Provincial Park and Algonquin Provincial

Park; and, directing field schools on Nipissing Nation Lands for Ojibway students. In addition to archaeological fieldwork, Ken teaches two Anthropology courses at Nipissing University in North Bay: an introduction to the archaeology of Lake Nipissing and the Ottawa Valley; and a field course of archaeological excavation.



Ms. Courtney Cameron has been working in the field of Heritage Resource management since 2000 and has worked throughout Canada for several environmental firms. She received her Bachelor of Science (Hons) from Lakehead University (1997), and her Master of Arts from the University of Alberta (2004).
