There are several unnamed geographic features throughout Algonquin Territory (e.g., waterbodies, falls, peninsulas). The Ontario Geographic Names Board frequently sends proposed place names to the AOO Consultation Office for review. As part of this consultation process, it is important for us to recommend names that reflect Algonquin people, history, and the Algonquin Language whenever possible. **You can help!**



Examples of Features in the AOO Territory and their Algonquin Names

Feature	Known Algonquin Name	Meaning
Baptiste Lake	Assi'ntowa'ningk	Signifying the lake were they "hunt with a long pole for fish (at night)."
L'Amable Lake	Kawa'n	The name L'Amable was likely after an Algonquin bearing that name as several were known in the Upper Madawaska in the early period. For example, Lamable Lavalley had a homestead at the south end of Hay Lake and Denis Lavelley had a camp on Lamable River.
Weslemakoon Lake	Sinimiku'ung	Signifying where "the beaver makes a hole in the rock."
Otter Lake	Nigik Sa'igun	
Bow Lake	Tigwal i Sa'igun	
Mink Lake	Shangwe'si Sa'igun	
Mississippi River	S'ni'miko'bi	"beaver creek"
