That We the Indian &
Warriors who now most respectfully appear
Excellency, do for ourselves and our respective
and Kindred, humbly and obediently implore You
as our temporal Father and Protector, to vouchsafe
gracious attention to and consideration of this the
Memorial of the Grievances and Deprivations with
your red Children, who have long endured patiently and
without complaint; under the conviction however
Grievances, now becoming more and more burden
when made known to your Excellency, our Tribe
obtain retribution; Justice and Equity having ever
co-ordinated with the Government over which You
so meritiously to preside.

Humble Memorial of the Chiefs and Warriors of
Kengwun and Nippissingue Indians in their mo-
st lives and their respective Nations, Tribes and Kindred,
respectfully Represents.

That We the Indian Chiefs and
Warriors who now most respectfully approach Your
Excellency, do for ourselves and our respective nations, tribes
and kindred, humbly and obediently implore Your Excellency
temporal Father and Protector to vouchsafe Your
attention to and consideration of this the humble
narrative of the grievances and Deprivations which We
the Children of Heaven long endured patiently and submissively
complaining; under the conviction however that those
days, now becoming more and more burdensome,
and known to Your Excellency, our Father, would
restitution, Justice and Equity having ever been
inta with the Government over which You continue
so nobly to preside.

Our Father, that We, and our ancestors have im-

tect us, your Red Children, and the other Indians

Percey Our great Father's Superintendent of
Affairs in His Proclamation dated at Johnson
the 24th day of December 1763, did expressly
and provide "That the Lands claimed by the L.

Father, that We, and our ancestors have immemorially
from the remotest antiquity, held, used, occupied, possessed,
enjoyed as hunting grounds, the tract of Land lying on
the side of the River Ottawa and little Rivers as far as
Nipissing, that is to say, comprehending both Banks
of the River Ottawa and of the River Mattawamkie, called by
voyageurs the Little River, to the height of Land separating
waters of the Lake Nipissing from those of the Little River;
therewith the Countries watered by the several tributary
rivers of the River Ottawa and Little Rivers running
thence South from their Sources; the above tract of land
ended to the Northward by a ridge of land separating
waters which fall into the Lakes and into the River
LACHINE from those falling to the Northward and
the River Ottawa; the distance from the Township of
Chambly (Pointe d'Orignal) to Lake Nipissing by
navigation is computed at 117 Leagues, 100 of which
rise the River Ottawa to the junction of the Little
with the River Mattawamkie; the actual settlement
resort by the Whites, extending from the said Township
Chambly to the last Settlement, inclusive —

That Our Great Father, George III, of glorious
memory, by His Royal Proclamation given at the Court
of James the 1st day of October 1763, promulgated
to your Red. Children, and the other Indian Tribes of
N. America by the Honorable Sir William Johnson
Our great Father's Superintendent of Indians
His royal Proclamation dated at Johnson Hall on
24th day of December 1763, did expressly declare
"providet" That the Lands claimed by the Indians as

Hunting grounds are reserved to them for that purpose; and that they shall not under any pretence whatever be molested or disturbed in the possession thereof, if they should be inclined to dispose of the same" in which case it is further declared and provided "That the same shall be purchased for Our Great Father in His said Name at some Public Meeting or Assembly to be held for that purpose by the Governor or Commander Chief.

Now, may it Your Excellency, our Father since Grants have been made and converted or erected Townships and Settlements for the Whites by Your Excellency's predecessors, of the Territory so immemorially used, occupied, possessed and enjoyed by us, your Children in Hunting grounds, without regard to and notwithstanding the provisions of the above Royal Proclamation and Great Father, no purchase or compensation for the same taken and dismembered from our Hunting grounds having been made of or to us over any of our Tribes, Nations indeed, although in all similar instances where Lands temporary Tribes, in Upper Canada, have been required in Great Father the same have uniformly been purchased stipulated price or for some certain compensation in virtue to the above Royal Proclamation of Our Great

That may it please Your Excellency Our
ter, We the Algonquin and Nippissing Indians
possess any Lands yielding to us any Revenue and
are solely dependant upon the Chase on our
ting grounds for support and maintenance, and

their Hunting grounds are reserved to them for their purpose; and that they shall not under any pretence be molested or disturbed in the possession thereof, unless they should be inclined to dispose of the same, which case it is further declared and provided that same shall be purchased for Our Great Father, King & Name at some Public Meeting or Assembly to be held for that purpose by the Governor or Lieutenant General.

Now, may it Your Excellency, our extensive Grants have been made and converted into Townships and Settlements for the White Escolaney's predecessors, of the Territory so much held, used, occupied, possessed and enjoyed by Red Children in Hunting grounds, without regard notwithstanding the provisions of the above Royal Proclamation of Our Great Father, no purchase or compensation made so taken and dismembered from our Hunter ever having been made of or to us or any of our Tribes, although in all similar instances we claimed by contemporary Tribes, in Upper Canada, have been by Our Great Father the same have uniformly been at a stipulated price or for some certain compensation obediencie to the above Royal Proclamation of Our Father.

That may it please Your Excellency, We the Algonquin and Nippissingue do not possess any Lands yielding to us any revenue hence are solely dependant upon the Chase on Hunting grounds for support and maintenance.

through your Red Children have not failed to view
progressive settlement by the Whites of our Hunting
grounds from the Township of Gloucesterburg to the last
tlement inclusive; as a forgetfulness of the above Royal
Charter of Our Great Father, we have never theretofore
tained hitherto from preferring any representation

protection of Your Excellency Our Father, touching
our humble claim to reasonable indemnification

our Red Children of the Tribes of the Algonquin and
Mississiquie Indians do not presume or venture to entertain

Although your Red Children have not failed

 Royal name at some public Meeting on Assembly of
 Indians to be held for that purpose. And moreover
 humbly pray that Your Excellency Our Father will
 cause to command by Proclamation or otherwise that
 Intruders or Squatters do forthwith depart from, and
 undisturbed and unmolested the Hunting grounds
 reserved and possessed by your Red Children, the whole
 in accordance to the above Royal Proclamation of Our
 Great Father.

We do by this our Memorial humbly submit
 to Your Excellency Our Father the foregoing representation
 grievances and deprivations which we your Red
 Children have endured and are likely to endure from the
 said dismemberment of our Hunting grounds, professed
 immorally and reserved and confirmed to us
 in the above Royal Proclamation of Our Great Father of

which Your Excellency Our Father now presented to us, but we do believe that a fair and reasonable compensation for the lands lying on the South side River Ottawa, so dismembered from our Hunting will be allowed and conceded unto us in obedience to the Royal Proclamation of Our Great Father. — And humbly and confidently appeal to Your Excellency to ratify and confirm to us your Red Children's use, occupation and possession of the Hunting grounds on the North side of the River Ottawa which yet are ours, and that in case we, your Red Children, or any may at any time hereafter be inclined to dispose of Lands, that the same be purchased for Our Great Father's Royal name at some public Meeting on the Indians to be held for that purpose. And we humbly pray that Your Excellency Our Father be pleased to command by Proclamation that all Intruders or Squatters do forthwith depart, leave undisturbed and unmolested the Hunting grounds reserved to and possessed by your Red Children in obedience to the above Royal Proclamation of Our Great Father.

We do by this our Memorial humbly to Your Excellency Our Father the foregoing report of the grievances and deprivations which we your Children have endured and are likely to endure, gradual dismemberment of our Hunting Grounds by us immemorially and reserved and confirmed by the above Royal Proclamation of Our Great

ious memory, and while we humbly recall to Excellency Our Father's recollection that our Tribes respectively have distinguished for Fidelity, Bravery general good conduct and attachment to the Royal & Our Great Father, particularly during the same Rebellion, we do yet wholly repose on the wisdom & Excellency Our Father, to whom we humbly pray to redress of our grievances and deprivations, and for dispensation of Justice and Equity touching the same.

rial has been forwarded through the India
