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1. Introduction

The Tribunal received a submission from one individual on behalf of himself and his community in support of retaining the ancestor Anna McDonald (RIN #2197) on the Schedule of Algonquin Ancestors. The submission was posted on the Tribunal's website at:

The submission was filed in response to the Enrolment Officer's Report on ancestor Anna McDonald, dated November 2022, which is posted on the website as Document 1 – Enrolment Officer's Report Regarding Ancestor Anna McDonald & Appendices.

This responding report addresses the content of the submission that is relevant to the Tribunal's inquiry, which is to determine whether Anna McDonald is identified in a historic record or document dated on or before December 31, 1921, in such a way that it would be reasonable to conclude she was considered to be an Algonquin or Nipissing, or a sibling of such a person. A "sibling of such a person" means a person with a common Algonquin parent.

The submission refers to documents that are contained in the Enrolment Officer's Report, as well as new documents. As noted in the Enrolment Officer's Report, archival documents recording a family's life events have been assigned ALG document numbers; RIN numbers have been assigned to individuals discussed in the report to aid in identification. Both RIN numbers and ALG numbers will be referenced in this report for ease of discussion. New relevant historical documents submitted by the respondents as well as some retrieved by the Enrolment Office are assigned ALG numbers, listed in Appendix A and attached in Appendix B for ease of reference.

2. Documents #2, 3, & 4 – Initial Submission by C. Bastien Jr. on behalf of himself and his community

C. Bastien Jr. forwarded an initial submission to the Tribunal in support of retaining ancestor Anna McDonald on the Schedule of Ancestors. The submission was forwarded in three parts and pertained to ancestors Anna McDonald (RIN #2197) and Cecile McDonell dit Mawishk (aka Cecile McDonell, RIN #14687). In this responding report, the Enrolment Officer focuses on the elements of the submission that are relevant to the parentage and identity of ancestor Anna McDonald. The elements that are relevant to ancestor Cecile McDonell are discussed in a separate responding report.

Part 1 of the respondent's submission included a two-page outline of his reasons and supporting historical documents. Part 2 included additional supporting documents regarding Alexander McDonell's HBC service. Part 3 included a memo on Margaret Cameron with supporting documents. The supporting documents provided in the three parts consist of baptismal records, census records, Hudson's Bay Company records, biographical sketches, and Margaret Ann Cameron's will.

In summary, the respondent states that the historical records demonstrate that Anna McDonald (RIN #2197) was the daughter of Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097) and that Alexander was the son of Allan McDonell and Margaret Anne Cameron.

The respondent also states that Cecile McDonell (RIN #14687) and Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097) were siblings. On that basis, the respondent submits that Anna McDonald (RIN #2197) is therefore the niece of Cecile McDonell. The material relevant to Anna McDonald is discussed under several topic headings as organized by the respondent.

The McDonald and McDonell surnames appear with various spellings in the historical documentation; the variations are reflected in this report.

2.1 Age, Parentage and Ethnic Identity of Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097)

The respondent provided evidence regarding the probable years of birth of Alexander McDonell. The purpose of this discussion was to demonstrate that Alexander McDonell and Cecile McDonell were born in the same general time period, could have been siblings, and that Alexander McDonell was possibly older than Cecile McDonell. The elements comparing Alexander and Cecile are discussed in full in the Cecile McDonell responding report. The material relevant to Alexander McDonell, who was said to be the father of Anna McDonald, is discussed below:

The respondent concluded that **Alexander McDonell** (various spellings) was probably born between 1806 and 1809 based on records regarding his marriage in 1837 and his contract with the Hudson's Bay Company (HBC). Records regarding Alexander McDonell's age are as follows:

- Alexander McDonell entered a contract for employment with the HBC on July 14, 1826.¹ His father Alan McDonnell (RIN #57432) signed for him which suggests that Alexander was under age (i.e., less than 21 years old) when the contract was made. Alexander's date of entering service is verified on his HBC biography sheet as is the fact that his father Allan McDonell signed for him. The contract specifies that Alexander is the son of Allan.² The fact that he was underage on July 14, 1826 places his date of birth after July 14, 1806. The respondent concludes that he was most likely between 17 and 20 years of

age when he entered service, which would be consistent with HBC practices. These facts suggest a birth date no later than 1809.

- The guide entitled "Understanding the Index to HBC Servants' Contracts, 1776-1927" on the Archives of Manitoba website states that the approximate age of the employee who signed the contract appears at the top of the contract. In the case of Alexander McDonell, the age of 17 is given at the very top of the contract page. This would give Alexander the confirmed birth year of 1809.³
- Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097) married Mary Ann McKay (RIN #14098) at Temiskaming on July 31, 1837. Both the bride and groom were resident at the Hudson's Bay Company post at Temiskaming/Temiscamigue at the time of their marriage. The record shows that he was "majeur," meaning that at the time of the marriage he had reached the age majority, which was 21 years of age. This record suggests that he was born prior to July 30, 1816. The record identifies him as "Metis," meaning of mixed Indigenous and non-Indigenous descent. Alexander's parents are not named on the document.⁴ Alexander's father, Allan McDonell, was known to be born in Scotland;⁵ consequently, Alexander's Indigenous heritage must have come from his mother.

2.2 Age and Identity of Margaret Cameron and her children

The respondent asserted that Margaret Ann Cameron (RIN #14101) was the wife of Allan McDonell and the mother of several children including Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097), the father of the subject ancestor Anna McDonald and consequently the paternal grandmother of the subject ancestor Anna McDonald.

The evidence regarding Margaret Anne Cameron, her spouse and their children is drawn from several sources including the HBC biographical sheet of her husband Allan McDonell,⁶ the historical study of the fur trade at Fort Temiskaming by Elaine Mitchell,⁷ her baptismal record,⁸ and her burial record⁹ which are cited in the Enrolment Officer's Report. Additional information is provided by the respondent in the form of Margaret Anne Cameron's last will and testament and several baptism and burial records. In addition, the genealogists for the Enrolment Office located and retrieved additional information about the family. The evidence of the children of Margaret Cameron and Allan McDonell is amalgamated and summarized below in subsection 2.2.a.

2.2.a Margaret Cameron and Allan McDonell's documented children

A variety of historical sources identify at least seven children of Allan McDonell and his country wife Margaret Cameron (aka Anne Cameron McDonell). The known details are as follows:

- Two children died young at the Red River Settlement. One was **Margaret McDonell** (RIN #22695) 1825-1835; the other is not named.¹⁰ A letter located in the Hudson's Bay Company records retrieved by the Enrolment Office explains the circumstances.¹¹ The letter, dated April 1836, states that part of Allan McDonell's family was boarded at the Red River Settlement for a total of two years, being: "the mother" (presumably Margaret Cameron) for two years; one daughter for 1.5 years; and one daughter for 0.5 years. The family had been placed there by Governor Simpson of the HBC. Allan McDonell's HBC Biographical sheet notes that he resigned due to ill health in August 1833 when he had been in charge of the Temiscamingue District.¹² Margaret, the mother, was baptized at the Red River in December 1833, her daughter Sophie was baptized and married there in December 1834, and her daughter Margaret died and was buried there in September 1835. Allan McDonell returned to duty as the chief factor in charge of the Lac La Pluie District sometime around June 1835. It is most likely that the Governor placed Allan's country wife and daughters in the Red River Settlement during his absence. The timing would suggest the two daughters boarded at the Red River with their mother Margaret Cameron were Sophie McDonell (RIN #22698) and Margaret McDonell (RIN #22695).
- Allan McDonell's HBC biographical sheet provides **Sophia McDonell's** (aka Sophie McDonell, RIN #22698) year of birth as 1811.¹³ Mitchell's study does not list Sophia. She may have been the other child who was referred to as dying young at the Red River but this is not clear.¹⁴ She married John Livingston (RIN #22699) on December 18, 1834¹⁵ having been baptized as an adult the day before at the Red River Settlement. On the baptismal record she was noted as the daughter of Chief Factor Allan McDonald (RIN #57432) and "a native woman." The presiding cleric was David Thomas Jones.¹⁶ No date of birth was given for Sophie on either her baptismal or marriage record. Sophia Livingstone was buried on August 8, 1835 at the age of 24 years old. Her death was recorded in HBC extracts from the registers of baptism, marriages and burials in Ruperts Land. Her age of 24 at the time of her death in 1835 gives Sophia's year of birth as being 1811.¹⁷ The biographical sheet for Allan McDonell provides Sophia's dates as 1811 to 1835, which is consistent with the primary records.

- **Angus Cameron McDonnell** (RIN #22695) was born at Lake Temiskaming.¹⁸ He was baptized on August 8, 1838 at the Red River. His age at baptism was not given. His parents were named as Chief Factor Allen McDonald (RIN #57432) and “a native woman;” he was living in the Lac La Pluie District at the time of his baptism. The presiding cleric was David Thomas Jones, the minister who baptized and performed the marriage of Angus’ sister Sophia, buried his sister Margaret, and baptised his mother Margaret Cameron between 1833 and 1835.¹⁹ His father Allan McDonell was the Chief Factor in charge of the Lac La Pluie District from June 1837 to around March 1840, serving at Fort Frances and Fort Alexander.²⁰ It is most likely that Angus was with his father at the time of his baptism at the Red River.
 - The 1871 Census for Montreal lists Angus McDonell along with his wife Anna and their children Agnes, Allen, Arthur, Edwin and Cameron. Angus’ age is given as 42 giving him a birthyear of 1829, this would have been while Allan McDonell was working as Chief trader for the Temiscamingue District.²¹

No HBC biographical sheet has been located for an Angus McDonell or McDonald. However, additional information has been located for Angus Cameron MacDonell. It is helpful for understanding the content of his mother’s will which is discussed in Section 2.2.b, below.

- Angus Cameron Mark Macdonell married Anna Maria Mansfield Mullins in 1854 in Montreal.²² On the marriage record Angus is noted as the son of age of Allan Lundy Macdonell and Dame Ann Cameron. Angus’ sister Anne Macdonell was a witness to the marriage.
- Angus remarried in 1880 to Marie Louise Filletreault in Montreal.²³ He was noted as the widower of his first wife, Anna Maria Mansfield Mullins, who is noted on Angus C. MacDonell’s obituary, mentioned below, as having died in 1876.
- Angus Cameron Macdonell died in January 1903 in Montreal.²⁴ The obituary published in the *Montreal Star* noted he was the son of Allan Lundy Macdonell formerly of the HBC. His mother was not named and no age at death was

recorded.²⁵ The article named his first and second wives and his surviving children who resided in the city, namely Mrs. E de Bellefeuille (Agnes Ann McDonell) and Miss Geraldine Macdonell.

- Angus Cameron McDonell's son, Allan G. MacDonell, was born on August 22, 1856. He applied for an American passport in 1919. On his application he declared that he was the son of Angus MacDonell who was born in Fort Temiskaming, Ontario and deceased at the time of the application. Allan had immigrated to the United States from Montreal in 1874.²⁶
- **Ann McDonell** (RIN #23582) is identified as one of Allan MacDonell and Margaret Cameron's children.²⁷ She was likely the daughter who was reported to be living with her mother around the time of Allan McDonell's death in 1859.²⁸ Angus Cameron McDonell's sister "Anne" witnessed his marriage in 1854 in Montreal.²⁹ She married Alex McK. Cowie of Montreal on July 30, 1863. On the marriage announcement she was said to be the "only daughter of the late Allan Lundy Macdonell."³⁰ Note that the other two documented daughters of Allan Macdonell, Sophia and Margaret, had died at the Red River Settlement in the 1830s.
- **John McDonnell** (RIN #22696) was imprisoned and sent to Australia.³¹ He died there in 1907 at the age of 76 giving him a birthyear of 1831.³²
- **Allan McDonnell (Jr.)** (RIN #5867) is listed in several sources but no further information has been located regarding his life or whereabouts.³³
- **Alexander McDonnell** (RIN #14097) joined the HBC at the age of 17 under the guidance of his father Allan McDonell.³⁴ He was born in 1809. When he married Mary Ann McKay (RIN #14098) at the Temiskaming HBC post in 1837 he was described as "Metis." While his parents were not named on the marriage document, his father was known to be Allan McDonell, who was born in Scotland, and whose country wife was Margaret Cameron, the daughter of fur trader Aeneas Cameron and an Indigenous woman from Lake Temiskaming, as discussed. Taken together the evidence indicates that Alexander

inherited his Indigenous identity from his mother Margaret Cameron. Alexander was the father of ancestor Anna McDonald. Evidence regarding Alexander, his parents and grandparents are also discussed in Sections 2.3.a, 2.3.d, and 2.5, below.

2.2.b Margaret Anne Cameron's Will and Age at Death

The respondent submitted the last will and testament of Anne Cameron as well as discussing several documents appended to the Enrolment Officer's report which are discussed below.

Margaret Cameron (RIN #14101), the wife of Sir Allan Lundy MacDonell was buried in August 1885. She was resident in Montreal at the time of her death. On the burial document she was named "Anne Cameron McDonell" and identified as the widow of Allan Lundy Macdonell formerly a chief factor of the Hudson's Bay Company.³⁵ Allan McDonell's HBC biography sheet and Elaine Mitchell's study of the fur trade at Fort Temiskaming noted that Allan retired to Montreal with his country wife, known as Margaret, a native woman said to be the daughter of Aeneas Cameron. Allan had succeeded Aeneas Cameron as chief factor at Temiskaming and continued to be in contact with him after retiring to Montreal.³⁶ Evidence of the children Margaret Cameron shared with Allan McDonell confirms that Anne Cameron McDonell and Margaret Cameron are the same person, the country wife of Allan McDonell.

The Enrolment Officer's Report for Anna McDonald (RIN #2197) read the age of Margaret Ann Cameron on her burial record as 86 years (quatre vingt six). The respondent read her age as 96 (quatre vingt seiz(e) with the final 'e' missing). A comparison with other records on the page supports the respondent's conclusion that the age on the burial record was 96 and not 86. This would suggest a year of birth around 1789 for Margaret Anne Cameron rather than 1799. Note that the 1871 census lists Ann Cameron living with her daughter Ann in Montreal. The age given for Ann Cameron on that census is 64, which would give her a birthyear of 1807. As per the list of documented children for whom birth years are known (listed in subsection 2.2.a, above), Margaret Ann Cameron's children were born from 1811 to 1831, suggesting that the age on the census record is incorrect.

The respondent submitted the last will and testament of "Dame Ann Cameron widow of late Allan Macdonell," dated September 23, 1879.³⁷ The document identifies her as the widow of the late Allan Macdonell, formerly a chief factor of the Hudson's Bay Company. The will indicates that she was unable to write and she signed with an X. She named her son Angus and his children in her will. The son and grandchildren who are named in the will have also been identified in corroborating documents, as follows:³⁸

- her son: Angus Cameron Macdonell of Montreal, baptism and death records noted above.
 - her granddaughter: Dame Agnes Ann MacDonell, wife of Edouard Lefebvre de Bellefeuille of Montreal. Agnes Anne McDonell was the daughter of Angus Cameron Mark McDonell and Anna Maria Mansfield Mullins, baptized in 1855 in Montreal.³⁹ Allan Lundy McDonell was the godfather to the girl.
 - her grandson: Edwin Macdonell (son of Angus Cameron and his first wife Anne Maria Mullins), baptized in 1862 in Montreal.⁴⁰
 - her grandson: Louis Cameron Macdonell (son of Angus Cameron and his first wife Anne Maria Mansfield Mullins), baptized in 1868 in Montreal.⁴¹ Gerald Allen Alexander McDonell and Agnes Anne McDonell were named as godparents. The godparents would be the siblings of Louis Cameron. Agnes Ann would be 13 at the time of baptism, and Gerald Allen would be 12.
 - her grandson: [illegible first name] Joseph Macdonell.
 - her granddaughter: Geraldine Macdonell (daughter of Angus Cameron and his first wife Anna Maria Mullins), baptized in 1876 in Montreal.⁴²

Alexander predeceased his mother so was not named in her will and none of Alexander's children were named in her will. However, two of Alexander's children had been left a legacy by Alexander's father Allan Macdonell who died several decades before his wife in 1859. Alexander predeceased his father which is the likely reason that Allan left money to these grandchildren.⁴³

Other known children of Margaret Anne Cameron and Allan McDonell were not named in her will. Sophia, Alexander, and Margaret are known to have died before Margaret Anne Cameron. Her son John had been transported to Australia as a convict; he did not die until 1907 but was not included in her will. The son Allan, for whom we have no information, was not named in the will. Her daughter Ann was also not named in her will; as noted above she married in 1863; her date of death is not known.

2.3 The Identity of Anna McDonald/McDonell, her parents and grandparents

This section focuses on the assertions and documents submitted by the respondent that related to the identity of ancestor Anna McDonald, her father Alexander McDonell, her mother Mary Ann McKay, and her paternal and maternal grandparents.

The documents regarding the asserted sibling relationship between Anna's father, Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097), and ancestor Cecile McDonell (RIN #14687) are discussed at length in a separate report regarding ancestor Cecile McDonell (RIN #14687).

The respondent notes that Anna McDonell (RIN #2197) was the daughter of Alexander McDonell and Mary Ann McKay and that she was baptized in 1845 at Temiscamingue. The text of the baptismal document indicates that she was baptized on June 15, 1845 at Temiscaming and that her parents were Alexander McDonnell and Manian McKay. The godparents were named as "Narcisse ron et Manian Kakikepkwe," (perhaps Narcisee Dorion).⁴⁴

2.3.a Anna's Father, Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097)

Anna's father Alexander McDonell (various spellings) is discussed at length above under section 2.1. A summary is provided under this section as it relates to Alexander being the father of Anna McDonald/McDonell.

Alexander McDonald/McDonell (RIN #14097) was an employee of the Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) from 1826 until his retirement in 1846. His HBC biographical sheet and HBC contract name him as the son of Allan McDonell. As demonstrated above, his mother was Margaret Cameron. The HBC biographical sheet stated that his parish of origin was "Indian Country." This suggests he was born somewhere in the territory in which his father Allan McDonell served as a trader for the HBC.

Alexander was contracted as an apprentice labourer by his father in July 1826 at the age of 17. He served in Swan River (now Manitoba), Lac La Pluie (Rainy River) and Temiscamingue, working in various occupations such as Labourer, Steersman and Runner. Alexander was attached to the post at Temiscamingue between 1833 and 1845. His HBC biographical sheet names his wife as "a daughter of John McKay," another HBC employee. The biographical sheet notes that two of Alexander's unnamed children were left a £100 legacy by their grandfather Allan McDonell.⁴⁵

Anna's parents Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097) and Mary Ann McKay (RIN #14098) were married on July 31, 1837 at the HBC Post at Temiskaming where they were living. The record identified Alexander McDonell as "Metis," meaning of mixed Indigenous and non-Indigenous descent but did not name his parents. His bride, Mary Ann McKay, was noted as the minor daughter of John McKay (RIN #14746) and Elizabeth Nettawabank dit Nikens (RIN #14747).⁴⁶

2.3.b Anna's Mother, Mary Ann McKay (RIN #14098)

When Mary Ann McKay was baptized at age 14 at the HBC post at Temiskaming in 1836 her parents were named on the baptismal record as John McKay and "Nikens."⁴⁷

As cited above, Mary Ann McKay's parents were named on her 1837 marriage certificate as John McKay and Elizabeth Nettawabank dit Nikens,⁴⁸ which is consistent with her baptismal record.

2.3.c Anna's Maternal Grandparents, John McKay (RIN #147746) and Nikens (RIN #14747)

Mary Ann's mother "Elisabeth Nettawabank dite Nikens" was baptized on July 25, 1836 at Temiscamingue at the aged of 39.⁴⁹ Elizabeth was baptized the day following the baptism of her daughter Mary Ann, cited above.

Mary Ann's parents, John McKay and Elisabeth Nettawabank dite Nikens, were married at Temiscamingue on July 25, 1836, the same day as Elizabeth's baptism. John McKay was noted as being a clerk for the Hudson's Bay Company, and the couple were stated as living at Temiscamingue. The marriage was witnessed by Basile Kijeinini and Paul Inini (dit Napons) (RIN #6437) both of whom are listed on the Schedule of Algonquin Ancestors.⁵⁰

Elizabeth and John legitimized five children, the oldest of whom, Mary Ann, had been born around 1822.⁵¹ John McKay's parents, the great-grandparents of Anna, have not been identified in any records; however, he is known to have been from the Temiscamingue/Temiskaming area, having started working there for the North West Company in 1815. In addition, HBC records show that he was related to the "principal Indians" of the area and had great influence among them.⁵² As cited on his biographical sheet, Elaine Mitchell claims in her study *Fort Timiskaming and the Fur Trade* that John McKay was the son of Donald McKay (1785-1820), but this has not been substantiated by primary historical records. If John McKay was from the Temiscamingue area and started his career in the fur trade in 1815, he must have been born prior to 1799 and had an Indigenous mother as there were no non-Indigenous women living in the Temiscamingue area at that time.

2.3.d Anna's Paternal Grandparents Allan McDonell (RIN #57432) and Margaret Cameron (RIN #14101), and Margaret Cameron's parents

Anna's paternal grandparents, the parents of Alexander McDonell, have been discussed at length above. Alexander's father was Allan McDonell (RIN #57432) a Scottish-born trader as

proven by several sources such as Allan McDonell's HBC biographical sheet, a biography of NWC traders, Elaine Mitchell's study of Fort Timiskaming in the fur trade, the baptism of his country wife, her burial record, and records related to his children (such as Alexander's contract with the Hudson's Bay Company), as supplied by the respondent.⁵³

Alexander's mother, Margaret Cameron (aka Anne Cameron, RIN #14101) is discussed at length under section 2.2. Margaret Cameron's father was Aeneas Cameron. Aeneas Cameron was another well-known fur trader for the HBC; his wife was noted as being an Indigenous woman from Fort Temiscamingue.⁵⁴

2.3.e Summary of Anna McDonald/McDonell identity

Anna McDonald derived her Indigenous descent through her maternal grandmother, Elizabeth Nettawabank dite Nikens (RIN #14747) who married John McKay at the HBC post at Temiskaming. It is most probable that John McKay also had Indigenous ancestry from that area. Anna McDonald also has Indigenous identity through her paternal grandmother Margaret Cameron, the daughter of Aeneas Cameron and an Indigenous woman from Lake Temiskaming. As noted in the Enrolment Officer's Report, the Fort Temiskaming trading post was located in traditional Algonquin territory.

2.4 Algonquin heritage

The respondent concludes that Anna McDonald's father, Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097), and Cecile McDonell (RIN #14687) were full brother and sister and that they are Algonquin. The evidence regarding the Algonquin identity of Anna McDonald is reviewed below.

The respondent submits that Anne/Anna McDonell (RIN #2197), the daughter of Alexander McDonell, was listed as Algonquin in census records. As documented in the Enrolment Officer's Report, a review of the census records from 1871 to 1921 includes the following years that provide an ethnic origin for Anna McDonel/McDonald (RIN #2197), who married Walter Ferris, as:

- 1871 census: Scotch;⁵⁵
- 1881 census: Indian;⁵⁶
- 1901 census: Algonquin Scotch Breed and Red;⁵⁷
- 1911 census: Scotch;⁵⁸ and

- 1921 census: ~~Algonquin~~ Indian.⁵⁹ The entire family was identified as "Indian" written to replace "Algonquin," which had been struck through.

The respondent submits that Anna's full sister Sophie McDonell (RIN #14099) is listed as Algonquin on census records. As documented in the Enrolment Officer's Report, a review of the census records from 1861 to 1911 includes the following years that provide an ethnic origin for Sophie McDonell/McDonald, who married Joseph Ferris, as:

- 1881 census: Scotch,⁶⁰
- 1901 census: Scotch Breed and Red. The Indigenous families on this sheet are listed as Algonquin, FB (French Breed), or SB (Scotch Breed);⁶¹ and
- 1911 census: French.⁶²

2.5 HBC Service of Alexander McDonell

The respondent asserts that Anna's father Alexander McDonell (RIN #14097) is mentioned many times as a "Native" working with the HBC.

Alexander McDonell's HBC biographical sheet shows his parish of origin as "Indian Country." This suggests he was born somewhere in the territory in which his father served as a trader for the HBC.⁶³ His year of birth on his contract was confirmed as 1809. The ethnic identity of Alexander and his mother Margaret Ann Cameron are discussed in subsections 2.1 and 2.2, above.

The respondent attached HBC account records for Alexander MacDonell/McDonell, showing him first as an apprentice in the Swan River District with a contract expiring in 1831. Later record shows him at Lac La Pluie and then at Temiskaming in the Moose District. These records of accounts are consistent with his contract and HBC Biographical Sheet. The use of the term "Native" in this context indicates that he was born in the HBC country as opposed to being born in Lower Canada or Europe. As noted above, he was born in 1809, at which time it is highly unlikely that any non-Indigenous woman was present and giving birth in that territory. The earliest records show his parish of origin as "Native." From 1835 his records note him as being from Hudson Bay, then from "Indian Country" beginning in 1845. The records supplied by the respondent are summarized below:

- The 1838-1839 account did not provide an age for Alexander. His Parish of origin was noted as Hudson Bay.⁷⁵ He is now noted as a Steersman at Temiscamingue being in the Moose District with his contract expiring in 1841.

- The 1847-1848 account noted that Alexander retired in 1846. No other information was recorded with the exception of the amount of debt owed to the company being just over 7 pounds.⁸⁴
- The 1853-1854 account noted that Alexander died on February 12, 1853. No other information was recorded with the exception of the amount of debt owed to the company being just over 1 pound.⁸⁵

made this twentieth day of July in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and twenty six BETWEEN Allan McDonnell Esq. now of York Factory in the County of York in the Province of North America of the one Part, and The Governor and Company of Adventurers of England Trading into Hudsons Bay, by George Simpson Esq. Governor their Agent of the other part as follows.

The said Alexander McDonnell with the consent of his Father hereby contracts and agrees to enter into the service and Employment of the said Company in North America in the capacity of Apprenticed Labourer and that he will continue when therewith required, on board such Ship or Vessel as shall be appointed by the said Company, and bound to Hudsons Bay and for the Term of seven Years to be reckoned from the date of his Contract, and for such further time as hereinafter mentioned and faithfully serve the said Company as their hired Servant in the capacity of Apprenticed Labourer and will do his duty as such and perform all such Work and Service by day or by night for the said Company in North America, or other their Offices or Agents for the time being. And that he will with courage and fidelity in his said Station in the said Service, defend the property of the said Company and their Factors and Servants, and will not absent himself from the said Service, nor engage or be concerned in any Trade or Employment, whatsoever, except for the benefit of the said Company, which shall come to the hands or possession of the said Alexander McDonnell - shall be held by him for the said Company only, and shall be duly delivered up to the said Governor or other Officer at their Factory or Trading Post, without any waste, spoil or injury thereof. And in case of any neglect or default herein, he shall make good to the said Company all such loss or damages as they shall sustain thereby, to be deducted out of his wages. And that the said Alexander McDonnell will faithfully obey all laws, Rules and Regulations established or made by the said Company for the good Government of their Settlements and Territories. And at all times during the residence of the said Company and aid and support their Officers and Agents to the utmost of his power. And the said Alexander McDonnell further engages and agrees, that in case he shall omit to give the expiration of the said term of seven Years of his intention to quit their Service and return to Europe, then that he hereby promises and engages to remain one year longer, and also until the next Ship in the service of the said Company shall sail from thence for Europe, as their hired Servant in North America, upon the like terms as are contained in this Contract, and the said Alexander McDonnell also engages and agrees that in case the said Company shall not have any Ship which will sail from Hudsons Bay for Europe immediately after the expiration of the said term of seven Years, or if such further term as hereinafter mentioned, then he hereby promises and engages to remain in the service as a hired Servant of the said Company in North America until the next Ship of the said Company shall quit from thence for Europe, upon the like terms as are contained in this Contract. And the said George Simpson on behalf of the said Company hereby engages that upon completion of the due and faithful Service of the said Alexander McDonnell in like manner as aforesaid, but not otherwise the said Alexander McDonnell shall receive from the said Company after the rate of Ten Pounds Sterling per Annum for three first years of this Agreement and the two last years Fifteen Pounds Sterling per Annum to commence on the day of his embarkation for Hudsons Bay as aforesaid, and up to the day of his embarkation from thence for Europe in one of the Ships of the said Company's Service, Provided always and it is hereby expressly agreed between the said Parties aforesaid, that it shall be lawful for the Governor or Governor, or other Officers of the said Company in North America, at any time during the said Term of seven Years, or such additional Term as aforesaid to dismiss the said Alexander McDonnell from their Service and direct his return from thence to Europe, in one of the Ships in their Employment, and in such case his Stages are to cease from the day of his embarkation for Europe. And further, that in case the said Alexander McDonnell shall at any time during this Contract, desert the Service of the said Company, or otherwise neglect or refuse duty to discharge his duty as such hired Servant as aforesaid, then he shall forfeit and pay all his Wages for the recovery whereof there shall be no relief either in Law or in Equity. I am directed by Mr. Christie to request that you will provide the Beavers, Spence and Favel, with two horses to take them on with all dispatch to Fort Pelly. If the Battaux shall have started before they reach that place, they will probably overtake them at Fort Ellice on their return. You will please to advance them about £2 each, if they require it, forwarding an account of the same here.

Dear Sir

James Monwick has requested me to remind you of a debt which he felt diffident to trouble you about during the winter, and would not now, but that his own means are rapidly diminishing.

It is for board, firing & lodging of your family; say the mother for two years, one daughter for 1½ year, the other for ½ year; or in all equal to two persons for two years. The Governor made no bargain with him when he placed them there, but in my hearing promised him a fair remuneration. His claim is £6 per annum for each person, amounting to £24 in all, which is about a third less than the usual charge in the settlement for such accomodation.

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Understanding the Index to HBC Servants' Contracts, 1776 -1927

The Hudson's Bay Company Archives holds thousands of servants' contracts, which date from about 1776-1927. This index includes the majority of these contracts, but this only represents a portion of the employees hired to work for the Hudson's Bay Company. If a person's name is not in this index, the contract may not have survived, it may be missing or filed elsewhere, or it may not have been created in the first place (this was often the case when individuals were employed for casual or seasonal work).

- Index Headings

Name

Employees' family (or last) names appear first, then their given (or first) name.

Date

This is the date the contract was signed, which is not necessarily the same as the date the individual began his term of employment with HBC. The index says n.d. if there is no date on the contract.

Age

This is often an approximate age which appears at the top of the contract.

Origin

This is the employee's place (generally a parish) of origin or where his first contract was signed. An example of a typical entry is "Scot OKI Birsay" where:

- Scot = Scotland
- OKI = Orkney Isles
- Birsay = Parish of Birsay / Name of the hamlet or farm

Work Location

This can refer to where the employee was working or where the contract was signed as the employee was traveling to his destination.

DR. ANGUS C. MACDONELL, WELL KNOWN PHYSICIAN, HAS PASSED AWAY.

The death is announced of Dr. Angus C. Macdonell, one of the oldest physicians in Montreal.

The event took place at the family residence, 778 LaGauchitiere street, yesterday, as a result of pneumonia, contracted during the recent cold spell while the doctor was visiting a patient.

The deceased was the eldest son of the late Allan Lundy Macdonell, formerly of Inverness, Scotland, and latterly of this city, chief factor of the Hudson Bay Company, and governor at Fort Temiscamingue.

Dr. Macdonell, after studying at the high school in this city and the Upper Canada College, Toronto, entered McGill University, where he secured his degree of M. D. in 1852.

On his return from Europe in 1854, he married Miss Anna Mansfield Mullins, sister of the late poet and authoress, Mrs. Leprohon. Mrs. Macdonell, died in 1876, and in 1880 he married Miss Marie L. Filia-trault, who survives him.

He leaves six children, of whom Mrs. E. L. de Bellefeuille and Miss Geraldine Macdonell are residents of this city.

The doctor was for more than twenty years on the consulting staff of the Hotel Dieu Hospital, and for many years attending physician on the Roman Catholic arch-bishops.
